Dogs & Cats

Geographic eligibility: Tarrant and Johnson Counties

Focus: Abused, injured or abandoned animals.

- Priority will be given to organizations that serve dogs and cats.
 - Organizations must not be breed-specific.
 - Grants for animal welfare will be awarded up to \$5,000 per organization.
 - Organizations with equine rescue programs may also submit a separate proposal for consideration under the equine welfare category.
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Equine Welfare & Therapy

Geographic Eligibility: Tarrant, Parker, Johnson, Young, Jack, Denton, Wise, Hood, Somervell, Bosque, and Hill Counties.

Focus: Equine welfare, protection, and equine therapy.

- Agencies that offer equine rescue, shelter, rehabilitation, adoption/foster care services, education about humane treatment of horses, or equine assisted therapy are eligible.
 - Grants for equine welfare will be awarded up to \$10,000 per organization.
 - Grants for equine therapy will be awarded up to \$10,000 per organization.

The Anita Berry Martin Memorial Fund

A native of Grand Prairie, Texas, In the 1960s and 1970s, Mrs. Martin attained professional success in the male-dominated sphere of computer systems engineering in the 1960s and 1970s. Her personal interest in genetics fueled Mrs. Martin's second career in Arabian horse breeding. Her enterprise in Parker County, Greystone Arabians, became one of the premier Arabian breeding and show horse ranches in the country.

The Helen D. and R.E. (Bob) Wallace Foundation Fund

Bob Wallace was a highly decorated World War II combat veteran. After the war, Mr. Wallace established R.E. Wallace Stamp and Coins in downtown Fort Worth, which he ran with Mrs. Wallace for more than 30 years. Mrs. Wallace was one of downtown's most colorful business people. The Fund was established in honor of Mrs. Wallace's lifelong passion for rescuing injured and strayed animals.
